

Mayor's Message



Good news about the replacement berm from Lakeview to Apple Hill!

The Town received notification on January 6th from the *Ministry of Transport Quebec* (MTQ) that the Berm was included in its three-year *Capital Expenditure Program* and that it would assume 50% of the costs of the project, including costs that were spent on the project in previous years.

In order for the Town's project to be receivable:

- The berm was evaluated as a replacement project (since it did not meet the MTQ's criteria as a new project);
- an additional 65 meters had to be added to the Town's project.

With the MTQ's involvement, the Town is now looking at the construction of the berm/sound barrier to be completed in 2021 (see Town website "Development Projects" section for more details).

Council has agreed to continue to work with the MTQ to complete this project and to await their analysis report and the details of the agreement to be signed between the Town and the MTQ.



60TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BAIE-D'URFÉ CURLING CLUB (BDCC)

"The Curling Club was the first major recreation facility to open in the '60s...With 228 members, the Club was off to a good start, although

it had been a difficult three years to get there. The idea had begun back in 1957 but the attempt to "get going" did not succeed, mostly because of misunderstanding regarding location and land transfers. In the spring of 1959, the project began and through many hours of hard work and financing arrangements, a first-class curling club was made possible. Parking was a problem and the Town exchanged land south of the Curling Club, on which hockey rinks were already flooded every year, for the same area of Town-owned land west of the club. At the same time the Town granted a right-of-way to Churchill Road to improve the situation."*

- Rang true when the Club opened on February 13, 1960 with Mayor Thomas Lee throwing the first rock;

- Rang true when I joined the Club in 1989, upon arriving in Baie-D'Urfé, and where I spent many days and nights at the Club with my family curling, participating in many social activities and swimming (there used to be a private BDCC pool on the ground);
- Rang true when I threw the first rock at the 60th Anniversary celebration on January 26.

The Club now boasts about 200 members and it continues to be a centre of sporting and social activity thanks to the influx of adult children of curlers (current and past) and new residents who have joined in the past couple of years.

If you haven't discovered the pleasures of curling or socializing at the BDCC, consider to do so. It was my family's home away from home for many years during the winter. And while you are at it, take a look at our other 60 years recreational club, the *Baie-D'Urfé Yacht Club* (the summer equivalent)!

Council Communiqué



At the beginning of my three weeks vacation in Florida (yes, I'm lucky) one of our first shopping stops was at *Costco* in Fort Lauderdale. Those of

During the budget process, the Director of Public Works, **Nicholas Mavrias** gave a presentation to Council on how streets are selected to be paved. A computer program has been developed for municipalities to make a more thorough examination of paved roads than what has been done in the past. Not only the surface, but also the street's infrastructure. Although a street seems visibly needing attention, underneath, the base may be strong and can have a longer life span than one with a seemingly smoother surface but with an invisible base in very poor condition.

Based on these recent analyses, Nicholas has given notice that the following streets have been targeted for paving in 2020.

- Surrey between Upper Cambridge and Churchill,
 Upper Cambridge in its entirety
- Victoria Place between Churchill and Victoria
- Dowker between Devon and Churchill
- Oxford to St. Andrews and St. Andrews between Oxford and Lakeshore
- Stafford between Westchester and Churchill Place


QUÉBEC IS GOING FORWARD WITH THE REFUNDABLE DEPOSIT EXPANSION!

"The Prime Minister, François Legault and the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Environment, and Fight Against Climate Change, Benoit Charette, confirmed that the Quebec Government will extend the deposit to all ready-to-drink beverage containers from 100 milliliters to 2 liters, whether they are in plastic, glass or metal. Multilayer cardboard containers will also be targeted, but in a second phase. This initiative will result in a very high recovery rate for all these containers, which are too often thrown into nature or end up in landfills, while improving the quality of recovered materials thanks to this form of source separation".

Since 1984, the deposit system has always been based on its content (beer and soft drinks), while the new government decision will advocate a system based on the classification of these containers.

Currently and according to *Recyc-Québec*, **2.4 BILLION** containers of beer and soft drinks are collected annually using the deposit system. With this new measure, more than **4 BILLION** containers will now be consigned annually, including **1 BILLION** plastic water bottles.

Subject to the adoption of this measure by the National Assembly, the new system is expected to come into effect "gradually" in the fall of 2022.



Town-owned Septic Systems INFORMATION

Aware of the importance of owning septic systems that meet the highest standards, the Town granted a mandate to the firm *Aqua Consilium Experts-Conseils* in July 2019, to evaluate the septic systems owned and operated by the Town.

Their mandate included the following:

Visual inspections of the system, validation of compliance, issue of a report with results of the inspections and recommendations for any repair, modification or replacement.

The systems to be inspected are the following:

- ► Town Hall
- **▶ Public Works/Rescue**
- ► Curling Club
- ▶ Red Barn
- ► Fritz Community Center
- ► The Gray House
- ▶ Whiteside-Taylor/Library
- ► BDAC (pool)
- ► Tennis Club
- Yacht Club

The replacement of the Yacht Club's septic system was already on the list of jobs to be done in 2019. It will finally begin this spring should the water level allows it.

We are currently exploring the possibility of combining and centralizing some of the systems that are in close proximity to each other (Whiteside-Taylor, Red Barn, Curling Club, Pool and Tennis Club).
