We ended by sitting in a circle. The elders who joined us shared stories about when they were young and there was no plastic *at all* and how they lived without it. The little ones listened. We held hands and gave a cheer for Mother Earth. There we all were, young and old and in between, canines too. We were one. This is what it is all about. This is our Baie-D'Urfé".

SEPTEMBER 28 EDIBLE ORCHARD PLANTED AT FRITZ FARM

With the grant that the Town received from *Trees Canada* and *Telus*, we are able to create an impressive edible orchard... an



orchard that boasts 41 fruit trees... with enough variety to please everyone: apple (12), pear (6), plum (6), cherry (6), serviceberry (6), apricot (3) and peach (2).



Many thanks go to some fifty volunteers who helped plant the orchard. Special thanks go to Irina Sambueva, Valérie Fortin and Richard Gregson for the excellent organization leading up to the planting, to MP Francis Scarpaleggia and MNA Greg Kelley who honored us with their presence, to Francis Deroo of *Provigo* for donating colorful baskets of edible fruit and of course to *Trees Canada* and *Telus* for their generous grant. Another special thanks go to Frans Lecluse for capturing memorable moments of this event.

We can all do our part for the environment by planting trees on our properties and by volunteering to nurture the Town's new edible tree forest. You will enjoy the benefit of fresh fruit, and also help to reduce greenhouse gases. According to **TreePeople.org**, one acre of mature fruit trees will absorb as much CO² as would be produced by driving 42,000 kilometers.

GARDEN AT FRITZ

This year, the volunteers:

- Delivered fresh, organic produce to three West Island food banks for the support of families in need;
- Harvested 3345 lbs of produce with an estimated retail value of about \$8500. Crops harvested included: 2000 lbs of tomatoes, 375 lbs of zucchinis, 465 lbs of cucumbers, 175 lbs of beans, 60 lbs of eggplants plus green peppers, squash and peas.
- Oversaw the creation of the Town's edible orchard

The FFYGPA offers opportunities to both youth and adult residents to gain hands-on experience and knowledge of food gardening.

There is always a need for more volunteers and I encourage all those excited by the creation of the edible orchard and the presence of the existing vegetable garden to come forward and offer your assistance. For these essential environment friendly projects to be successful and sustainable



for the years to come, it is important that the community gets involved. An hour or two of hands-on help on a Saturday morning will ensure continued success of these important initiatives.

BAIE-D'URFÉ YACHT CLUB AND ITS JUNIOR SQUADRON (BDJS)

Congratulations go to the *Baie-D'Urfé Yacht Club* (BDYC) on celebrating this year the 60th anniversary of its foundation by Mr. Frank Booth and Mr. Miles Wisenthal. The two gentlemen were instrumental in forming the Club in order to develop a harbour for sailing boats in the Bertold Park area. 60 years later and the BDYC has established itself as one of the best yacht clubs on the island with a waiting list to get in and with a Junior Sailing Program that was recently recognized as the Best Sailing School in Québec by the *Fédération de voile de Québec*.

The Junior Sailing Program began in 1962 using a small fleet of Flying Junior's, a class which forms part of the present Squadron

Fleet. This sailing school has trained a large number of local sailors through the years, some of whom have become serious competitors.

The BDYC offers four two-week sessions starting the last week of June until mid-August with a program based on the *Canadian Yachting Association CAN* Sail program standards. The program provides safe, standardized instruction for



recreation and competition in sailing dinghies. Students are instructed in sailing theory, sailing technique and care and maintenance of the boats. Priority is given to on-water practice of these skills. Once fundamentals have been mastered, the more advanced students are introduced to small boat racing.

The BDYC is proud to host the *Junior Squadron Race Team*. These young sailors race Optimist and 420 fleets all across Canada, participating in National and Provincial Races on the sailing circuit. This year the race teams participated in 6 regattas and performed

exceptionally well in all of them. In some regattas, they were up against **120 boats!** In all 6 regattas, the BDJS had sailors place in the **TOP 10!** Impressive finishes in the 420's by **Ben Hogg** & **Brendan Haines** (5th, 9th, 3rd); **Remi Tran** & **Anthony Biello** (4th, 9th, 1st, 7th); **Alex Côté** & **Ishan Soni** (9th); in the *Opti Green Fleet* competitions, **Vincent Boisvert** shined (4th, 2nd, 3rd, 3rd)!

About 100 Baie-D'Urfé youngsters took advantage of the BDJS program in 2019. I have been told that many of the youth walked from the Town pool (morning swimming lessons) to the *Yacht Club* for their afternoon sailing session. What a way to spend your summer! Something to think about for your children or grandchildren in 2020!

Hello,

As I prepare to write this column
I pondered what I would write

about. The sun is shining the temperature is

comfortable and lots and lots of leaves are still to fall. This column will focus on the *Coast Guard*, the *Rescue Squad* as well as the *Vcops* and finally the Baie-D'Urfé Public Works. With the exception of Public Works 3 out of 4 are volunteers and they are but a few of the many volunteer organizations.

The Coast Guard, for example, has had, up until the end of October, a rather busy summer season. Regular weekend patrols, **28 emergency calls** answered, **69 souls** brought safely to shore, **150 hours** of volunteer crews dealing with emergencies. Each call had 3 crewmembers on board, a stellar response time for crews to leave of less than **10 minutes** from time of call. Combined estimated value of boats rescued approximately 462,000 dollars. Truly an impressive record, well done.

The Rescue Squad, again a volunteer organization of well trained professionals, in September alone, provided **180 hours** of support to several organizations. On September 6, 11, 24, 25, 27, the squad provided first aid support for several schools in Baie-D'Urfé. The squad hosted a reception for *Nova West Island* and the *On Rock Community Services Organization*. August saw the squad organize the *Vintage Auto Show* at Fritz and donated funds from this event to the two preceding organizations.

These are but a sample of the many things that rescue is involved in on a yearly basis besides doing their search and rescue operations. A, "Well Done" to this organization also.

The Volunteer Citizens on Patrol (Vcops), which most of Baie-D'Urfé is familiar with, have also had a busy time of it. The Vcops patrol the town with two volunteers to a patrol on a daily basis and have a stellar record of doing so for many years now. They are the eyes and ears of the town when on patrol and are of great assistance when required. These volunteers are present at the various functions of the town. Some examples of this are the swimming meets, the *Car show, Baie-D'Urfé Days*, school openings and assisting in traffic directing when required. These are but a few of functions that this volunteer organization contributes to the town. Well done VCOPS!

And last, but certainly not least, is our own **Public Works department**. I wanted to mention them because they ensure



from an operational and repair function that the town runs smoothly. They often go unnoticed but without this well managed and professional department, Baie-D'Urfé would be no different from other towns. This department has had a certain amount of flux this past year with several key people moving elsewhere and retiring. Nonetheless they have been very busy with many projects. For example, Bertold Park, a drinking fountain, benches and picnic tables are to be installed in the spring, the wooded area was cleaned and trimmed, fence installation was done as well as the new signage. In John Weir Park, new playground equipment was installed, replacing decrepit parts of existing structures, large amounts of buckthorn was removed and cleaned of debris as well as removing poison ivy. At the Lakeshore property (the bottom of Apple Hill) a large metal barge was moved, the pathway was cleared of debris, the surface was leveled and dead trees removed. Surrey will see the unintended speed bumps removed as a result of repairs to some piping. On Lakeshore Road, the north side curb lane and bike lane asphalt in a westerly direction is almost completed and weather permitting, the south side may begin soon. If not, this work will start next spring.

These are but a few of what our Public Works department does besides the general maintenance of water services, branch pickup, line painting, wood chip delivery, park container garbage collection, tree trimming and the list goes on.

The PW have also been preparing for winter. They have a new sidewalk plow and a new saltbox on the 5ton truck. This salt spreader scatters the product from a centre point rather than the side



thus covering more of the surface in one pass. They are also involved in various projects in the Industrial Park. Again, a "Well Done" to this very important department of Baie-D'Urfé.

In closing, it has been a pleasant summer and fall and with the PW department planning for winter, let it snow, let it snow. Enjoy winter everyone and for those who enjoy cross-country skiing, remember the *Morgan Arboretum*.
